Mineta Transportation Institute Executive Director Invited to Washington DC for President Obama's National High-Speed Rail Plan Announcement

Hon. Rod Diridon, Sr. will take part in Thursday, April 16 meeting with the President.

San Jose, CA, April 15, 2009 – The Hon. Rod Diridon, Sr., executive director of the <u>Mineta</u> <u>Transportation Institute</u> (MTI), has been invited to participate in a public announcement of President Barack Obama's national high-speed rail (HSR) master plan. The President's announcement will take place at the Executive Office Building adjacent to the White House on Thursday, April 16, at 9:00 a.m. EDT. Mr. Diridon will be part of a select group of national HSR leaders attending the meeting.

"The announcement underscores the President's high regard for high-speed rail and its ability to create jobs and mobility for the United States," said Mr. Diridon.

In addition to his role with MTI, Mr. Diridon is chair emeritus and a member of the board of directors for the California High-Speed Rail Authority. He also chairs the National High-Speed and Inter-City Rail Committee of the American Public Transportation Association.

California voters recently approved a \$9.95 billion bond measure to build a high-speed rail system between Los Angeles and San Francisco. Those funds, coupled with the \$8 billion in HSR funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act stimulus program, help to make the California high-speed rail project a reality.
